EYFS have been busy little detectives trying to solve the case of the runaway Gingerbread Man! Mrs Watson was baking gingerbread in the kitchen, when all of a sudden a gingerbread man jumped off the tray! Mrs Dedicoat reviewed the CCTV and thought Reception would be the best detectives for the case. We followed

our maps and searched for evidence with our magnifying glasses. We wrote down clues and collected lots of evidence along the way! Coincidently, Mrs Allum was having a meeting with PC Fisk that morning so of course we invited him in to have a look at the evidence.

He took some statements from the children and is working hard back at the police station... Despite our best efforts unfortunately, he is still on the run! We made predictions in Drawing Club as to where he could be and came up with some excellent ideas. "He might have gone to the beach", "I think he's been eaten by a shark!", "I think he's tired after all that running and is sleeping in my bed". To extend our computing skills we have writing algorithms to move the Bee Bots in the classroom. The children have been designing mazes and debugging their algorithms if they don't reach the final goal.

In maths we have been exploring numbers up to 20. We have been making different numbers using ten frames, comparing and ordering them.

Year One has been enjoying reading our new Power of Reading book "The Lonely Beast". We have discovered why he is lonely and have given him advice about what he can do about it. We have been writing character descriptions and thinking about the verbs used in the story to describe his actions.

We have been thinking about where we live in Geography and produced fact books explaining why the Lonely Beast should visit Ipswich. We have also started to think about what the Beast would see if he went around the United Kingdom. Year 2 had a great start to the new year from exploring hot and cold climates to identifying different habitats, their features and the living things that are there. During choose our learning time the children have been busy creating habitats and settings using the small world and adding a range of writing alongside this.




Year Two









The children have been super enthusiastic about our new topic 'Our Wonderful World'. We begun the term learning about the different parts of a volcano. Using their knowledge of this, the children then had a whole day to create their very own volcanoes and are looking forward to erupting these this week!



Year Three





In English, the children have created some fantastic non-chronological reports about volcanoes. They carried out their own research to gain lots of facts and then wrote these in the style of a report. The children focused on using exciting sentence starters to grab the reader's attention and ensured their reports were eye-catching too.



In Art, we have been exploring the work of Alice Kettle and Hannah Rae, who will be used as inspiration for the children's final art pieces. We will be using paint, cloth and thread to create a textured art piece, with a specific focus on the natural world.

Year Four

We have had another wonderful start to this term, creating our classrooms for our new story, 'Arthur and the Golden Rope' by turning them into blazing infernos! We have looked at persuasive language and written and performed adverts to encourage holiday makers to visit Iceland.





In Science, we have looked at how the ear works and how this affects balance. While in Maths, we have explored various methods of multiplication and division. Flute lessons continue to go from strength to strength, so well done to all children for their determination and stamina to keep trying to improve!



We have now started to investigate the invasion of Britain by the Anglo-Saxons and we are looking forward to an exciting visit from 'Portals to the Past' next half term.

In maths, we have been recapping our knowledge of multiplication and division using methods such as formal column, bus stop and the grid method. In Spanish we have been learning how to say days of the week and months of the year, as well as revisiting pets, greetings, colours and numbers - we are all becoming very multilingual!

We always love January, as it means the start of our crime and punishment topic and we begin reading our new Power of Reading text: The Highwayman. We started the term by splitting into tribes and each tribe designing a new society with rules and laws to live by. This was a great way to see which laws the children had heard of and which ones they felt were important to society. In English, we have been looking at the role of redcoats (not the Butlins ones!) and why they were important to society before a regular police force was established. We will be working towards writing an information text on "How to be a good Redcoat" using our knowledge of subheadings, imperative verbs, lists and formal language.

Year 6 have continued to blow us away with their unwavering commitment and sense of responsibility as they contribute to the wider school, and beyond. As staff in year 6, we have been able to take a step back and watch the children run reading clubs, support children as they come into school, at lunchtime and at break. As Sport Leaders, they continue to uphold the high standards set by Mr. Hatcher in PE. All of this while maintaining infectious smiles on their faces. It is truly heart warming to witness their enthusiasm and leadership in these roles.

In the classroom, Year 6 have been delving into the captivating story of Ernest Shackleton and his legendary journey to the Antarctic. This has prompted an array of exceptional writing and some fantastic discussions about various ships throughout history.

OFSTED says Suffolk is failing children with special needs

"They and their families have not seen the improvements they should from the area's leadership. Their needs are not identified quickly or accurately enough. Assessments for support take too long.

"When the right help is put in place, it is often only at the point of crisis.

"Unidentified and unmet needs sometimes manifest in behaviours which too frequently result in many not accessing mainstream settings, because of exclusion or absence.
