## Our learning this half term:

- Multiplication; use multiplication and division facts for the 3, 4 and 8 multiplication tables. To write and calculate mathematical statements for multiplication and division using the learnt multiplication tables.
- Immersing ourselves in a chosen text- Arthur and the Golden Rope
- Formal letter writing
- Understanding different types of non-fiction through writing a persuasive text- a tourist guide book- and features of newspaper
- Composing music using the flute
- Sound— explore how sound is generated and how volume is altered
- Investigate the art of display
- Internet safety and further blockly programming using BBC microbits
- The Viking and Anglo Saxon struggle for the kingdom of England. Ask historic questions about change, cause, similarity, difference and significance.
- Explore health and wellbeing — safety first

- Daily reading sessions
- Learning spellings of the Year 4 spelling patterns- see spelling list for Spring 2
- Consonant suffixes - tion, sion, ssion, cian; further work on adverbs; words with double consonants.
- Handwriting- letter formation /fluency in joining letters
- TT Rock-stars- daily practise
