Reception



The temperature has dropped in EYFS as we have been learning all about penguins in Antarctica through our book 'Blue Penguin'. The children have amazed us with their knowledge, questioning, creativity and imagination. The children have shown an interest in a variety of animals which live in colder climates including Polar Bears, which we found out live in the Arctic (The North Pole with Santa!). We've been continuing to expand our learning on numbers 1 to 5 in a variety of ways this month too. The children have begun writing captions with their known sounds in phonics, remembering to segment and use finger spaces, they've even started writing letters to 'Blue Penguin' in Antarctica.







Year One











This term we have been following the journey of the snail and the whale, visiting the seven continents around the world. So far, the children have enjoyed exploring Antarctica and South America. In Art, we have been creating mixed media collages to represent the landscape of Antarctica, including the animals that live there and the Southern lights. We have also been learning about the layers of the Amazon Rainforest and exploring the animals in each of the different layers. In Science, the children have been experimenting with ice and were able to make their own predictions and perform a simple test. I wonder where the snail and the whale will take us next?

Year Two

In year 2 we have been exploring woodland habitats linked to our power of reading book a Winters Sleep. The children have used the settings to develop their use of descriptive language and make links to their own experiences of these environments. In maths we have been consolidating our understanding of times tables and have just started to explore the inverse relationship of division through sharing. If you happen to enjoy a packet of sugary treats at the weekend could you explore sharing further? We would love to see some examples on Dojo.










Year Three





Year 3 have been continuing their work with Midnight Feasts, using the poem as a basis for a non chronological report. We even had a letter from the government.

We have also been focusing on division in Maths and have applied these to lots of practical tasks.

We have also been using Midnight Feasts to create and design some recipes!











Year Four

Even though the children have only been back at school a short while, Year 4 have already immersed themselves in the exciting adventure of Arthur and the Golden Rope, researching Iceland (Arthur's home) and performing persuasive adverts.

They have made the flaming cauldron in Arthur's village and wrapped the classrooms in the golden rope that leads Arthur on his adventures.

In History and D.T, they have begun to investigate The Vikings, creating their own runes and weaving cloth.

While in Science, they have begun to examine states of matter and consider questions, such as,

' If sand pours is it a liquid?'

Happy New Year! We've had a fantastic start to 2022 in year 5. The children have returned from the Christmas break enthusiastic and keen to learn. We started our new topic of Crime and Punishment and began our new Power of Reading text, The Highwayman. The children love this tale of the dashing highwayman and Bess, the landlord's daughter. We have explored the text using different mediums. The classes were asked to create a visual representation of some of the famous lines in the poem, and they amazed us with their interpretations and beautiful artwork. We have also made class dictionaries based on some of the new words that we have learnt through our reading of the text. We have now added words such as casement, rapier and galleon to our repertoires!






Year Six

Year 6 have made such a fantastic start to the new term and really impressed us with the way that they have thrown themselves back into their learning. Our new Power of Reading book, 'The Other Side of Truth' has already grabbed their attention and some fantastic writing in role as one of the main characters has been produced. We changed the normal writing process and swapped our written drafting for an oral recording with very interesting results. We have also used this text to inspire our Art lessons and have started looking at patterns in African art with a view to eventually creating some pieces using batik and, in Music, we have been thinking about African drumming and creating rhythms, some really exciting work!
